We have just completed the appointment process and it is with great pleasure we can announce to our community that Megan Moore, who is also a parent of our school, will begin in the bursar position at the start of Term 4.

It has been fantastic getting around the classrooms and seeing the exciting things children are doing in preparation for the Film Festival 'Through the Lens'. Going into classrooms at anytime I have seen children filming, acting, editing or directing. Having seen snippets of these amazing creations we are in for a real treat!

As a result of some amazing work the Year 5/6 Eco Group are involved in there have been some startling new initiatives that will happen for St Martins School in the very near future. This week we received a special gift from Beeline of a beehive and soon to arrive a family of bees who will soon be pollinating and producing honey for St Martins School. More information will be shared with you by the Eco Team about this wonderful project.

In addition to this, New World St Martins are very generously donating a Bee house with 50 hibernating bees, a mounting post, wildflower seeds and a bumble bee nesting box. The bees are leaf cutter bees which are gentle, pollinating specialists. They don't make honey and therefore don't aggressively defend their hives. The 50 bees inside will be dormant and won't emerge until it has been 21 degrees celsius for 21 days (non-consecutive).
