Kia ora Whānau - Greetings everyone.

It was pleasing to see so many parents at our Meet the Teacher meeting last Thursday. The feedback has been very encouraging and provides us with some very good suggestions for future meetings.

It seems hard to believe it is five years since our world turned upside down! The shakes we had the weekend before last reminded us of how 'raw' the emotions of some still remain. We could see that those wobbles had significant effect on a number of our students and their families. St Martins has set up many support systems for children in need of support, some quite visible and others tailored to meet specific needs as they arise. It is important to know that as a school we do have strong networks for providing support or for knowing where the most appropriate support can be accessed.

Sometimes the support that might be required is only a conversation away. These conversations can create clearer understanding for us, and allow the school to respond in practical or other ways. Uniform: (See school website for full details)

### The school uniform code is as follows:

**Compulsory Uniform Items:** Polo Shirt, Polarfleece Jacket (Seniors may wear the Senior Jacket), Bucket Hat, either Unisex Short or Girls Skort, Long Socks and Girls Tights – must be navy blue or Ankle Socks or Hideaway Socks – must be white or navy blue, Shoes – must be dark coloured, preferably black but navy and dark brown are acceptable

**Optional items:** Unisex Cargo Pants, Girls Summer Dress – in royal blue gingham, Terms 1 and 4 only, Winter Jacket (Waterproof, Polarfleece-lined), Long Sleeve Thermal Undergarment (navy blue), Beanie.

While most of the uniform is being worn well the exception is footwear. Very bright sports shoes are becoming popular. Children are permitted to wear sports shoes for sporting activities, or to bring them along to change into at break time. Many sport shoe companies are now producing sports lines in black. We ask that you consider this when upgrading sports shoes if your child is intending to wear that style of shoe to and from school also.

#### Scooters:

Please find a way to 'name' your child's scooter if it is to be brought to school. Most weeks there are scooters left behind at school. Our trusty caretaker will generally put these away, but without a name they are often left at school, sometimes for many months until being reclaimed. Your support with this would be appreciated.

### Smart Governance - News from the BoT

Those of you new to the school might not know what the Board of Trustees (BoT) actually does. First and foremost the BoT is responsible for student progress and achievement. The BoT has overall responsibility for the school. This includes legal obligations covering curriculum, property, personnel, finance and health and safety.

Our BoT is made up of the following representatives: five elected parents, a co-opted Whānau Group member, a staff member, the Principal and Secretary.



We meet each month and report back to the school community about what we're working on. Here are the key outcomes from our meeting on 16 February:

- At the start of each year we elect a new Chair and Deputy. Nikki Tod was elected Chair, Jo Malcolm Deputy.
- We'd like to acknowledge the Smart Community and all the parent helpers that chipped in and made the Start of Year BBQ a huge success.
- Last year we trialled a water safety programme across the school: beach education in the Year 0-2 syndicate; pool based water safety in the Year 3/4 syndicate; beach education in the Year 5/6 syndicate; water safety as part of the adventure programme in Year 7/8. This programme will continue this year. Keep an eye out for a survey that will be sent out this term we are gathering feedback and ideas to help us plan our aquatic programme for 2017.
- At our next meeting on 15 March we will farewell our current Whānau Group representative Mike Gibbs and welcome Karaitiana Taiuru. There will be an official Māori handover at 6.30pm in the Staffroom. All welcome.

#### **Board Elections**

The BoT mid-term elections are coming up in June. Two parent representative positions are available. Richard Boon and Deirdre Richardson are standing down. Nominations open on 6 May and close on 20 May. More information will come out in due course. All parent representatives are elected by our school community. Voting will take place between 25 May - 3 June.
