This week Alice, Leanne and myself attended a curriculum roadshow based on changes to the Literacy and Maths curriculum as well as the proposed refreshing of all other curriculum areas. The Government's direction is based on putting in place a knowledge based curriculum that emphasises direct teaching focussed on the science of learning. We believe that we have been working hard to implement the changes required and can see the benefits of these. As always there will be trade offs when we change, we will continue to discuss these and adapt as we go.

Last term the Y3 - 8 children completed their wellbeing survey. Highlights from the survey include the following positive results:

- 97% Teachers care about their students
- 97% Teachers help students when they are stuck on their work
- 96% The Principal and Deputy Principals handle misbehaviour in a fair way
- 95% Students feel safe at school
- 95% Teachers listen to what students have to say
- 93% Teachers let students know how they can improve their work
- 92% Teachers tell students when they are doing a good job

We finish the week with the Lachie Sutherland Memorial football game, students vs staff and ex pupils. Lachie would have been graduating high school this year. We'll hold a moment of reflection before kick-off, remembering Lachie and others we've lost.

Leanne, Alice or I are out at the waharoa most mornings, if you would like to have a chat about anything feel free to stop by.

I'm hoping to reclaim top spot in Y5 - 8 mini golf this morning, we'll see what happens with Thomas and his friends.





# Tweens & Screens: Raising Screen-Smart Kids in a Digital World

Are you finding it tricky to manage your tween's screen time? Maybe your 10–12 year old is begging for a phone, hooked on gaming, or facing online issues that feel overwhelming. You're not alone, and there are practical ways forward.

In this honest and research-informed evening, parenting and play advocate Celia Hogan will unpack what's really going on for tweens in the digital age, and how parents can navigate this stage with more confidence and connection.
